IT raids in B'luru: Rs 42 crore found in a flat, money was meant to be transported to poll-bound Rajasthan

BENGALURU, Oct 13 (Agencies): Sleuths of the Income Tax Department found cash amounting to crores beneath the bed at a flat in Bengaluru, sources stated on Friday. The IT officers are questioning a former woman corporator and her husband in connection with the case.

Sources said that vast amount of money is being collected from gold jewellers and other sources in Bengaluru to fund Assembly elections in five states, especially in Rajasthan. On getting



tip offs in this regard, the IT Department is conducting raids in the city.

The cash, amounting to Rs 42 crore, was found during a raid conducted late on Thursday night at a flat located in Atmananda Colony near

RT Nagar. Sources said that Rs 500 denomination notes to the tune of Rs 42 crore were kept in 23 boxes under the bed. After getting a tip-off the IT officers had conducted raids at two locations in RT Nagar and they

found the cash in one of the locations.

Govt invites bids for city gas distribution licenses in J&K

SRINAGAR, Oct 13 (Agencies): To expand the reach of natural gas in the country, Government has invited bids for licenses to supply natural gas to households, automobiles and small

industries in five northeastern states and UTs of J&K and Ladakh.

Petroleum and Natural Gas Regulatory Board (PNGRB) offered eight geographical areas (GAs) under the 12th city gas distribution (CGD) bidding round for retailing of CNG to automobiles and piping the fuel to household kitchens and industries.

Launching the bid round, Oil Minister Hardeep Singh Puri said after this round, gas will be taken to islands which are the only uncovered areas.

Calling the Natural Gas, an environment friendly clean fossil fuel, Hardeep Singh Puri, Minister of Petroleum & Natural Gas and

Paddy production surges by 5-10% in Kashmir due to favorable conditions SRINAGAR, Oct 13 incessant rains initially He also said that the

SRINAGAR, Oct 13 (Agencies): Director of Agriculture, Kashmir, Choudhary Iqbal on Friday said that paddy production has increased by 5 to 10% this year due to timely rains and favorable temperatures in Kashmir.

Speaking to Greater Kashmir, the Director of Agriculture said, "We had completed seeding earlier, and although incessant rains initially raised concerns about paddy saplings this year, later climate conditions improved. We began paddy transplanting on time. When paddy saplings are planted before June 21st, the crop has ample time for growth. Favorable rainfall and temperatures resulted in a production increase of 5 to 10% compared to

Agriculture department is raising awareness about the benefits of agriculture and advocating for the preservation of agricultural land by adopting horizontal housing.

However, a local farmer expressed concerns, saying that agriculture is not financially lucrative in Kashmir due to high production costs and low revenue.

It said the weather fluctuations can cause a significant drop in temperature across Jammu and Kashmir.







Women social activists protest outside Domana Police Station, seek justice for Bhim Singh, Jay Mala

JAMMU, Oct 13: 2023: Expressing their deep concern and dismay over the lack of action in response to repeated complaints from the relatives of Prof. Bhim Singh to the Police and the Revenue Department of Jammu and Kashmir regarding the mysterious death of Jay Mala, unauthorized withdrawals from her bank accounts, and the unlawful seizure of Bhim Singh's properties and lands, a determined group of women, including relatives, friends, and associates of Jay Mala and Prof. Bhim Singh, led by BDC Chairperson Neelam Devi and esteemed women social activists Sudesh Dogra and Meena Kumari, conducted a substantial demonstration outside the Domana Police Station today. The female activists, armed with placards, marched towards the station, raising slogans such as "Justice for Jay Mala, Justice for All," "Down with the Police-Criminal Nexus," and "Hold the culprits accountable for looting Jay Mala's bank accounts." Furthermore, the protestors held a secondary protest outside the residence of Vilakshan Singh and



demanded his immediate arrest for his involvement in the unlawful appropriation of Prof. Bhim Singh's properties and lands. Chanting "Arrest Vilakshan Singh," the protestors sought to draw attention to the government's inaction in shielding such notorious individu-

Addressing the gathering, Mrs. Sudesh Dogra highlighted the fact that the post-mortem report of Jay Mala appears to have been neglected by the Domana Police, suggesting collusion with those involved in the alleged murder. She expressed her frustration that, despite compelling evidence implicating the culprits, no action has been taken, and the police department has been uncooperative with the investigations for over

five months. Numerous delegations have submitted memorandums and provided substantial evidence of criminal conspiracies against Jay Mala by certain individuals with criminal intent. Promises of a prompt inquiry have not been honored, and the family members are convinced that the Domana police are complicit in shielding the alleged murderers, failing to take any meaningful action. It is alarming that the Domana police have not even reviewed the CCTV footage from the bank where the criminals withdrew money using Mala's ATM card over the past five months, revealing suspicious motives and a possible cover-up, as remarked by Ms. Neelam, an elected BDC chairperson closely associated with Smt. Jay Mala's family.

Neelam expressed her shock at the usurpation of land belonging to Prof. Bhim Singh in Sidhra by a notorious individual from Sidhra, in collaboration with corrupt revenue officers. She lamented that the encroacher enjoyed impunity due to the patronage of a BJP leader from Udhampur who recently joined the Saffron Party to seek protection for his questionable dealings in the past. The fraudulent entry in land records, affecting one of the region's eminent leaders and former MLC, continues unchecked, with the perpetrators seemingly protected for reasons known only to a few.

Speaking on the occasion, Smt. Meena and Nisha Sharma revealed that Prof. Bhim Singh owned a one-kanal piece of land in Sidhra, the Legislative Council in 2003-04. This hut was deliberately set on fire by vested interests, who then proceeded to seize the land upon which the hut stood. Furthermore. the same vested interests forcibly entered Bhim Singh's building at Rajinder Bazaar, vandalized the property, and tampered with important documents before locking the building. Despite reporting these incidents to the police, no action has been taken to apprehend the criminals.

Ankit Love has already written to both the Police and Civil administration, outlining how Prof. Bhim Singh's property was looted by "Vilakshan Singh and his accomplices," and how Jay Mala's bank accounts were pillaged by the same individuals, seemingly with political connections that have prevented a proper investigation. Given the rampant corruption in Jammu and Kashmir and the alleged involvement of the police in shielding criminal elements, there are serious doubts about the possibility of justice being served in the region, as raised by the female activists.

MEAL PLANNING

t is not very easy to provide acceptable mi to each member of the family according their likings. Even after being familiar all the principles of meal planning, a house- is often unable to select foods according to members of the family as the number of factors affect meal planning which are as follows:

The amount and the kind of food for a family depend on its income. With the decrease in income percentage, expenditure food increases and hence more careful efforts are required to plan meals. Society can be divided into three categories on the basis of income – lower, middle, and high income groups.

With the increase in income, choice in selecting foods can be wider for seasonal or non-seasonal foods and such foods can be procured locally or from far off places. But people belonging to lower income group can't afford costly foods such as milk, meat, fruits, etc. Therefore, it is desirable to adopt such measures that provide nutritious food at a low cost. Use more of less expensive foods like cereals. In place of expensive cereals like rice and wheat, use low cost cereals like rage, mower, bare, etc. Use jiggery in place of sugar. Use seasonal and locally produced fruits and vegetables. Use methods like sprouting, fermentation, and combination of foods to enhance nutritive value. For example, khichdi made by combination of cereal and pulses is very nutritious food. Use methods like pressure cooking to retain nutritive value of foods, Use cheap nuts like groundnuts and utilise leftovers properly.

Amount of food served in the family is largely determined by the number of its members. More members mean more food for the family. The nature of the family whether nuclear or joint also affects the meal planning to a large extent

Normally women require less food as compared to men because of their less height, weight, body composition, and physical activity, e.g., a 30 years-old woman doing heavy work requires 3000 calories per day but the requirement of a male of the same age and doing the same work requires 3900 calories per day.

Some specific body conditions affect the nutritional requirements, e.g., during pregnancy and lactation the body requires more nutrients. A diabetic patient requires less of carbohydrates. A person with high blood pressure requires less salt.

Meals should be in accordance to the season. With the change in season, availability of foodstuffs and our taste also change. In summers, bottle gourd, ridge gourd, pumpkin, tinder, bitter gourd, etc., are in abundance whereas carrots, radish, tomato, peas, cauliflower, etc., in winters. Seasonal foods are also more likeable as well as nutritious.

Physical requirements also change with the change in season. Cold drinks like lemon water, soft drinks, ice creams, kali, etc. are liked in summer and hot drinks like tea, coffee and high calorie foods like peanuts or till chick, pannier, hot pakoras, tike, Samoa, etc., are preferred in winter. Therefore, a housewife must choose vegetables, fruits, and other foodstuffs according to the season.

Availability of food also affects the meal planning. A housewife should make maximum use of locally produced foodstuffs because they are cheap, tasty and compatible with the climate. For example, sea food is easily available and cheap in coastal areas so it is the staple food of the people living there.

Including mango or watermelon in diet is useless in winter if it is not available. Today with increasing the means of transportation, preservation and storage, the availability of foodstuffs has increased by which at the time of more variety need can be added to the meal.

'Big ideas for change': What 2023 Eco Nobel is all about

Then Amartya Sen was awarded the Nobel Prize in Economics in 1998, I was asked by Prime Minister Atal Behari Vajpayee for a briefing on him. I tried to explain about his ethical concerns about prolonged and increasing income inequality, to which Vajpayee tersely said: "Sankshipt mein batao!" He was happy with my next attempt which was "for being a good human being!" Just a few months before that, Lal Krishna Advani inquired from me whether I was familiar with his work? I gave him three books by Sen I had read till then, all of whom related to Inequality, Ethics and Economics. I could make out that Mr Advani, who is a keen reader of books -- all manner of books, was "impressioned" enough to ask me if I could arrange for him to meet Prof. Sen. I told him that I did not know him but would try to make a connection.

But Sen's Nobel Prize took care of that. The Vajpayee government welcomed the award and honoured him with receptions and meetings. The finance ministry hosted a grand luncheon meeting at the Taj where he was awarded a "Golden Pass" for unlimited free flights by first-class on Air India. While giving it, the finance minister said it was to encourage him to visit India more frequently and advise the government.

But a few months later the Graham Staines incident took place and Amartya Sen commented critically about it. The government then lost its fascination with him and about his concerns for inequality.

Earlier this week my daughter asked me about why Claudia Goldin was awarded the 2023

Economics Nobel. I said it was as much for pointing out the obvious discriminations against women in all fields as it was for that in economics. Ever since the Sveriges Riksbank (Sweden's central bank) instituted "The Sveriges Riksbank Prize in Economic Sciences in Memory of Alfred Nobel", and it has since been awarded by the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences according to the same principles as for the other Nobel Prizes, the prize in economic sciences was awarded to 90 men and just three women. Prof. Claudia Goldin was the first woman to get it alone.

The first of the three women Nobel economics laurates was Elinor Ostrom, who won it in 2009 for postulating that "local communities are the best at managing their natural resources as they are the ones that use them and that all regulation on the use of resources should be done at the local level, as opposed to a higher, central authority that does not have direct interaction with the resources". The next woman to win it was Esther Duflo, jointly with her husband Abhijit Banerjee and Michael Kremer for their "experimental approach to alleviating global poverty".

Abhijit Banerjee and Esther Duflo won it ironically enough for their study in eastern Odisha of one the most spectacular development economic bombs of recent times. It was a scheme to replace open-fire cooking used by three billion of the world's poorest people with more efficient, less polluting stoves. The \$400 million project was backed by the United Nations and launched by former US secretary of state Hillary Clinton in 2010. It set out to reduce indoor air pollution, which kills two million people a year, while empowering women and helping the environment. After

initial success, millions of stoves built in India were largely abandoned within four years. Banerjee and Duflo studied the reasons for it and told the world why such an altruistic and even rational project flopped. The reasons were quite mundane, something which the world's finest development economics and policy-making minds did not anticipate. The new stoves needed more attention, were prone to break down and took longer to cook food. They couldn't be moved because they were tethered to fixed chimneys, sending the smoke out-

But Duflo did, to my mind, a more remarkable economics research in Russia as a graduate student in 1993 when she wrote a paper on how the Soviet Union "had used the big construction sites, like the Stalingrad tractor factory, for propaganda, and how propaganda requirements changed the actual shape of the projects". This is exactly what Ratan Tata and Narendra Modi did with the Tata Nano car factory in Sanand, Gujarat. One wanted to refashion how the Indian middle class aspired and locally travelled and the other wanted to remake Gujarat as an industrial society, all based on an ill-designed lowcost car. Neither Duflo or Banerjee were accorded any honours by the Narendra Modi government, or even a meeting.

Economics, possibly because of its associations with politics, money and finance has for long been dominated by men. In the United States, only a fourth of the academics considered to be on tenure track are women. Even in economics, women generally tend to be drawn to the areas leaning on social issues like health, education, labour welfare, wage and gender parity. These are not attention-

gathering fields. Claudia Goldin spent her professional lifetime as a labour economist and has been focused for over three decades on the gender pay gap.

The Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences said on Monday: "This year's Laureate in the Economic Sciences, Claudia Goldin, provided the first comprehensive account of women's earnings and labour market participation through the centuries. Her research reveals the causes of change, as well as the main sources of the remaining gender gap." To us in India, this recognition of a gender gap in policy-making is also a tribute to Elinor Ostrom for empowering local communities, to Esther Duflo for empirically analysed development policies decisionmaking. Our political system has recently endorsed the need for a huge change in political decision-making and power-sharing by agreeing to reserve a third of places in Parliament and the state legislatures for women. This is in keeping with the national mood. Every politician worth his and less often her salt knows that the national mood and perceptions are decisive in determining national outcomes. Speaking to reporters at her home in Cambridge, Massachusetts, Dr Goldin hailed the decision to award her the Nobel Prize as a recognition of "big ideas and for a long-term change".

Claudia Goldin, who in 1990 became the first woman to get tenure at Harvard University's economics department, added: "There are still large differences between women and men in terms of what they do, how they're remunerated and so on. And the question is: why is this the case? And that's what the work is about."

Protest against alleged backdoor appointments in J&K

JAMMU, Oct 13: A protest rally organized by DOGRA FRONT & SHIV SENA, led by its president, Ashok Gupta, was held in Jammu city to voice concerns over alleged backdoor appointments in the state, specifically regarding the appointment of Sved Aroot Madani as the executive officer in the Khadi Village Industries Board (KVIB).

Syed Aroot Madani, a relative of Jammu and Kashmir Chief Minister Mehbooba Mufti, and the son of Sartaj Madani, who holds the position of Vice President of the ruling Jammu and Kashmir Peoples Democratic Party (PDP), was selected for the executive officer role in the KVIB.

The appointment process has raised questions of nepotism, leading to candidates filing



Right to Information (RTI) requests to access details of the selection criteria and the marks obtained by candidates who secured these posi-

It is noteworthy that the KVIB had issued a notification in October 2016, soliciting applications for various posts, including Executive Officer, Assistant Executive Officer, Publicity Officer, and Field Publicity Officer. The final results of the selected candidates were recently made public.

One of the primary concerns raised during the protest was the involvement of a private agency, LME&S Pvt Ltd, in conducting the written exams for these positions, instead of utilizing established recruitment boards, such as the J&K State Service Selection Board.

The protesters, under the leadership of Mr. Ashok Gupta, expressed their demand for transparency and accountability in the selection process. They questioned how the son of the PDP Vice President and nephew of PDP General Secretary Peerzada Mansoor Hussain secured a place on the list of selected Executive Officers.

The demonstration highlighted concerns surrounding alleged backdoor appointments and called for a more merit-based approach to filling government positions. It cited a statement by the Jammu and Kashmir chief secretary, asserting that 2.5 lakh 'undeserving' candidates had obtained jobs in the union territory through backdoor appointments. The protest called for these individuals to be removed from their positions and replaced with deserving candidates chosen based on merit.

The protesters sought public disclosure of the names of individuals involved in these backdoor appointments and urged the government to reevaluate these appointments through a transparent and meritbased application process.


NEW DELHI, Oct 13 (Agencies): Amid the ongoing Israel-Hamas conflict, Prime Minister Narendra Modi today said terrorism anywhere in the world and in any form is against humanity and asserted that it is time for peace and brotherhood and to move forward while walking together.

He also said that conflicts and confrontations in any part of the world impact everyone and do not benefit anyone, as he called for the world to move forward with a human-centric approach.

Addressing the inaugural session of the ninth G20 Parliamentary Speakers' Summit (P20) in New Delhi, he also said that we have to remove obstacles in the way of global trust.

PM Modi said this is the time for peace and brotherhood, and time to move forward together. His remarks came against the backdrop of a series of brazen attacks on Israeli towns by Hamas over the weekend which triggered fresh tensions in the region.

Referring to the attack on Parliament House some 20 years ago, the Prime Minister said

Woke up to sound of sirens, spent time in shelters: Indian evacuees from Israel recount horror



NEW DELHI, Oct 13 (Agencies): Glad to be home and traumatised by what they had seen in the last few days, the first batch of around 200 Indians returned from Israel on Friday with the sound of air raid sirens, rocket fire and screams ringing loud in their ears.

Israel witnessed a surprise and unprecedented attack by Hamas in its southern parts on Saturday morning. At least 700 people have been killed and more than 2,100 injured in Israel — the deadliest day for the country in at least 50 years.

"We woke up to sounds of air raid sirens. We stay in central Israel and I don't know what shape this conflict will take," said Shashwat Singh soon after landing at Delhi airport along with his wife.

The post-doctoral researcher in agriculture, who has been staring in Israel since 2019, said the sound of those sirens and the nightmarish experience of the past few days still haunt him.

The evacuation of Indians is a "praiseworthy step", Singh said soon after the flight landed. "We hope peace will be restored and we will return to work... The Indian government got in touch with us via email. We are thankful to Prime Minister Modiand the Indian Embassy in Israel."

India has launched Operation Ajay to facilitate the return of those who wish to come back home as a series of brazen attacks on Israeli towns by Hamas militants over the weekend triggered fresh tension in the region.

Many students who returned home recalled the fateful night of Saturday and how they had to rush to shelters multiple times in the wake of rocket attacks by Hamas.

Suparno Ghosh, a West Bengal native and a first-year PhD student of the Ben-Gurion University of the Negev at Beersheba in Israel, was also among the group of Indians who reached Delhi on the special flight.

"We could not know what happened. On Saturday, some rockets were launched. But, we were safe in shelters... the good thing is that the Israeli government has made shelters everywhere, so we were safe," he said.

Several women students also recounted the grim situation they faced when the attacks happened. "It was a panic situation. We are not citizens there, we are just students. So, whenever the sirens go on, it's a panic situation for us," Jaipur native Mini Sharma told agency.

Asked when she received the information about the rescue flight, she replied, "Just a day before."

"We packed our bags last morning after receiving a message from the Indian Embassy. They were very helpful. We were able to get in touch with them round the clock," Sharma said.

Deepak, another student, said, "We heard sirens on Saturday. We could also hear the sound of the attack. Israeli authorities were instructing us (to take safety measures). I am happy to return home but at the same time sad that our friends are there (in Israel)." The evacuation process was very smooth, the student told reporters.

Duti Banerjee, another West Bengal native who was also among the first batch of Indians evacuated from Israel, said the situation in Israel ias "pretty messy and unsettled".

"Normal life has been paused. People are scared and angry. Even when I was leaving, I heard sirens and had to go to a shelter," she said.

Soni, another student, thanked the governments of India and Israel for "taking such good care of us".

"I booked two flights as I was not sure when would the Indian government evacuate us. But, I am glad to be back... many Indians are still in Israel," she said.

MEA spokesperson Arindam Bagchi on Thursday said around 18,000 Indians are currently residing in Israel while about a dozen people are in the West Bank and three to four are in Gaza.

Union Minister Rajeev Chandrasekhar welcomed the passengers at the Delhi airport as they streamed into the lounge area from the tarmac side. He greeted them with folded hands and also shook hands with many of them saying, "Welcome home".

2 Men Arrested In Connection With 16,180 Crore Fraud: Maharashtra Cops

THANE, Oct 13 (Agencies): The police in Maharashtra's Thane city have arrested two persons for their alleged role in a financial crime that involved breaching the system of a payment gateway service provider and siphoning off more than 16,180 crore, an official said on Friday.

The police on Thursday arrested Anup Dubey (26) of Bhayander, and Mumbai resident Sanjay Namdeo Gaikwad (42),

a partner in a firm, the official said.

According to the police, the fraud had been taking place for a long time, but it came to light after a complaint was lodged with the Srinagar police station about the hacking of the payment gateway system of the company in April 2023 and 35 erors being sinkered off.

2023 and 25 crore being siphoned off. During the probe, the cyber cell team came across suspicious transactions of more than 16,180 crore.

The Naupada police in the city on October 6 registered a case against five

persons under sections 420 (cheating), 409 (criminal breach of trust), 467, 468 (forgery), 120B (criminal conspiracy) and 34 (common intention) and provisions of the Information Technology Act. As per the FIR, one of the accused, named Jitendra Pandey, earlier worked

for 8 to 10 years with banks as a relationship and sales manager.

The police suspect there may be many players in this mega racket, which has been going on for long, and may

have pan-India ramifications affecting several companies and individuals, the official said.

The police had earlier said that the accused allegedly set up several partnership firms on bogus documents to

launder the amount.

As many as five partnership firms were set up by the accused, and transactions to the tune of 16,180 crore were revealed after the inspection of 260

bank statements, police had said.

Hamas practised in plain sight, posting video of mock attack weeks before border breach

A slickly produced two-minute propaganda video posted on social media by Hamas

JERUSALEM, Oct 13 (Agencies): Less than a month before Hamas fighters blew through Israel's high-tech "Iron Wall" and launched an attack that would leave more than 1,200 Israelis dead, they practised in a very public dress rehearsal.

A slickly produced two-minute propaganda video posted on social media by Hamas on September 12 shows fighters using explosives to blast through a replica of the border gate, sweep in on pickup trucks and then move building by building through a full-scale reconstruction of an Israeli town, firing automatic weapons at human-silhouetted paper targets.

The Islamic militant group's live-fire exercise dubbed operation 'Strong Pillar' also shows militants wearing body armour and combat fatigues swiftly carrying out operations that included the destruction of mock-ups of the wall's concrete towers and a communications antenna. just as they would do for real in the deadly attack last Saturday.

While Israel's highly regarded security and intelligence services were clearly caught flatfooted by Hamas' ability to breach its Gaza defences, the group appears to have hidden its extensive preparations for the deadly assault in plain sight.

"There clearly were warnings and indications that should have been picked up," said Bradley Bowman, a former US Army officer who is now senior director of the Centre on Military and Political Power at the Foundation for Defence of Democracies, a Washington research institute. "Or maybe they were picked up, but they didn't spark necessary preparations to prevent these horrific terrorist acts from hap-

Shortly after dawn on Saturday, Hamas fighters pushed through Netanyahu's wall in a matter of minutes. And they did it on the relative cheap, using explosive charges to blow holes in the barrier and then sending in bulldozers to widen the breaches as fighters streamed through on motorcycles and in pick-up trucks. Cameras and communications gear were bombarded by off-the-shelf commercial drones adapted to drop hand grenades and mortar shells a tactic borrowed directly from the battlefields of Ukraine.

Snipers took out Israel's sophisticated roboguns by targeting their exposed ammunition boxes, causing them to explode. Militants armed with assault rifles sailed over the Israeli defences slung under paragliders, providing Hamas airborne troops despite lacking airplanes. Increasingly sophisticated homemade rockets, capable of striking Israel's capital of Tel Aviv, substituted for a lack of

heavy artillery.

North Korea warns of nuclear response as US Navy ship arrives in South Korea



SEOUL, Oct 13 (Agencies): North Korea lashed out Friday at the arrival of a US aircraft carrier battle group in South Korea, calling it a provocation and again raising the spectre of using nuclear weapons to defend itself.

Emboldened by its advancing nuclear arsenal, North Korea has increasingly issued threats to use such weapons preemptively. But the North is still outgunned by US and South Korean forces, and experts say it is unlikely to use its nukes first, though it will continue to upgrade those arms without returning to diplomacy for the time being.

The North's latest nuclear threat came a day after the USS Ronald Reagan and its battle group arrived at South Korea's southeastern port of Busan, following US-South Korean-Japanese naval exercise in international waters earlier this week.

South Korean defence officials said the carrier is to be docked at Busan for five days as part of an agreement to increase the temporary deployments of powerful US military assets in response to the North's growing nuclear program.

On Friday, the North's official Korean Central News Agency called the aircraft carrier's arrival "an undisguised military provocation" that proves a US. plan to attack North Korea is being realised. It threatened to respond in line with its escalatory nuclear doctrine that authorises the preemptive use of nuclear weapons.

"The (North Korean) doctrine on the use of nuclear weapons already opened to the public allows the execution of necessary action procedures in case a nuclear attack is launched against it or it is judged that the use of nuclear weapons against it is imminent,"

the KCNA dispatch said. North Korea's "most powerful and rapid first strike will be given to the 'extended deterrence' means, used by the US to hallucinate its followers, and the bases of evil in the Korean peninsula and its vicinity," KCNA added.

North Korea has argued it was forced to develop nuclear weapons to cope with what it calls the US and South Korean plots to invade. It has often made furious responses to the deployment of US strategic assets like aircraft carriers, long-range bombers and nuclearpowered submarines as well as US joint training exercises with South Korean forces.

Many experts say North Korea heightens tensions with its rivals to provide a pretext for expanding its nuclear arsenal and then uses the arms as leverage to wrest greater outside concessions.

Since last year, North Korea has conducted more than 100 missile tests in the name of responding to the expanded US-South Korean military drills. Washington and Seoul say their drills are defen-

sive in nature. Last year, North Korea adopted a law that stipulates a broad range of situations in which it can use nuclear weapons, including when it determines that its leadership faces imminent attack by hostile forces or when it needs to prevent an unspecified catastrophic crisis to its people and government.

The US and South Korean governments have repeatedly warned that any attempt by North Korea to use nuclear weapons would result in the end of the North's government led

Hamas rejects Israel order to evacuate 1.1 million people of north Gaza

GAZA CITY, Oct 13 (Agencies): Hamas on Friday rejected an Israeli order for 1.1 million residents to evacuate northern Gaza ahead of an expected ground incursion into the overcrowded Palestinian territory.

"Our Palestinian people reject the threat of the occupation (Israeli) leaders and its call for them to leave their homes and flee from them to the south or Egypt," the Islamist militant group said in a statement.

"We are steadfast on our land and in our homes and our cities. There will be no displacement," it said.

The United Nations said an order by Israel to flee within 24 hours risked a "calamitous situation".

Israeli strikes on the coastal enclave have killed more than 1,530 people since Saturday, in retaliation for Hamas militants killing around 1,200 people in

254 Nepali students airlifted from war-hit Israel reach home

KATHMANDU, Oct 13 (Agencies): A group of 254 Nepali students, rescued from the strifetorn Israel and led by Foreign Minister N P Saud, arrived in Kathmandu on Friday.

A Nepal Airlines flight that took off from Israel's Ben Gurion International Airport on Thursday landed at Tribhuvan International Airport here this morning after a stopover in Dubai.

Speaking to the media at the airport, Foreign Minister Saud, who flew to Israel a day before to facilitate the rescue mission, said the remaining Nepalis who have requested repatriation would be rescued soon.

The minister said 557 Nepalis had provided their details in response to a request from the Embassy of Nepal in Tel Aviv to those wishing to return to Nepal or relocate to safer places.



"Out of the 557 Nepalis, 503 had applied to return to Nepal and among them 254 have returned home today with us," he was quoted as saying by the news agency.

Minister Saud also said that 54 Nepalis who had requested to be relocated from risky areas

have been shifted to safer zones in Israel

Palestinian militant group Hamas carried out a barrage of air strikes in Southern Israel on Saturday which killed 10 Nepali students. Six students were res-

cued and one went missing. "A search continues for Bipin

Joshi who has gone missing following the attacks. We will share the information as soon as we get additional information on this," Saud said.

"The Israeli side has stated that it will take some time for handing over the bodies as it is required to complete the legal process and keep separate details of each and every deceased, and the number of bodies in Israel is currently very high," he said, requesting the families and relatives of the deceased Nepalis to have patience.

man in Fauda, said, "As you can see, I am in slightly different attire today. This is not a scene from Fauda; this is real

Clad in a soldier's uniform with a gun in his hand, Amedi further said, "Our army was called up on Saturday morning as events in the south of Israel began. All I wanted to tell you is that, alongside horrifying and vicious attacks, where our friends and loved ones were murdered, our morale remains high."

In his video message, the actor continued, "We fully comprehend why we are here. We are here to protect our children, our families, and our homes." He promised, "We will not surrender until we win."

Amedi also thanked all Israeli citizens for sending "care packages" to the fighters on the front line.

"Millions of items are sent to us daily, as well as your beautifully written letters and drawings from the children. It gives us strength, and I love you," he added.

"I hope we will see quieter days soon," he concluded the one-minute video message.

Israel Embassy Employee Attacked In China As **Country Declares War On Hamas**

BEIJING, Oct 13 (Agencies): An Israeli embassy worker in Beijing was attacked on Friday, Israel's foreign ministry said.

"An Israeli employee of the Israeli embassy in Beijing was attacked today," a foreign ministry statement said, adding that the attack did not take place at the embassy compound in the Chinese capital.

"The employee is being treated at hospital and is in stable condition," the statement said.

"The motive for the assault is being looked into." The attack comes after Hamas gunmen killed more than 1,200 people in Israel and took about 150 hos-

tages in their surprise attack on Saturday. Israel has retaliated by raining air and artillery strikes on Hamas targets in the Gaza Strip for six days, which

have left over 1,350 dead there. A statement on the Israeli foreign ministry website warned that Hamas had called on "all of its supporters around the world to hold a 'Day of Rage'" on Friday to "attack Israelis and Jews".

"It is reasonable to assume that there will be protest events in various countries that are liable to turn violent," the statement said.

13 Hostages Held In Gaza Killed In Israeli Air Strikes, **Hamas Claims**



GAZA CITY, Oct 13 (Agencies): At least 13 Israeli and foreign hostages held in the northern Gaza Strip have been killed in Israeli air strikes in the past 24 hours, Hamas's armed wing said Friday.

In a surprise assault early Saturday, Hamas militants stormed Israeli communities near the Gaza border and fired barrages of rockets, in an attack that claimed more than 1,200 lives.

Israel says Hamas has taken more than 150 people hostage, including both civilians and security forces.

"Thirteen prisoners... including foreigners" were killed in five locations targeted by Israeli fighter jets, the Ezzedine al-Qassam Brigades said in a statement.

Israel has rained air and artillery strikes on the blockaded Gaza Strip -- a densely populated enclave of 2.4 million people -- flattening buildings and killing more than 1,500 people. According to the Hamas media office in Gaza, at least 500 children are among the dead.

The Ezzedine al-Qassam Brigades had warned this week that "every targeting of our people without warning will be met with the execution of one of the civilian hostages".

Govt invites bids for city gas distribution licenses in J&K

Housing & Urban Affairs said that it has huge potential in providing solutions to the environmental challenges as well as ever growing energy needs in a sustainable manner. Accordingly, he said that Government of India has focused to promote the usage of Natural Gas as a fuel/feedstock across the country to increase the share of Natural Gas in primary energy mix from current level to 15% in coming years.

Speaking on the occasion, Hardeep Singh Puri noted that successful conclusion of 11th CGD bidding round has increased potential coverage of CGD sector to about 98% population and 88% geographical area of the country. The 12th bidding round launched today will help in expansion of CGD coverage further, he said.

Air India Express set to induct 50 new Boeing 737 MAX planes in next 15 months

NEW DELHI, Oct 13 (Agencies): Air India Express, which is in the process of merging AIX Connect with itself, plans to induct 50 new B737 MAX planes in the next 15 months as the Tata Group bolsters its aviation business.

Besides, the combined entity of Air India Express, also the country's first international budget carrier, and AIX Connect, formerly known as AirAsia India, will be launching its new brand on October 18.

In a message to staff this week, Air India Express and AIX Connect Managing Director Aloke Singh said key milestones, including migration to a common reservations and check-in system, have been achieved in terms of integration of the two carriers.

Currently, the combined entity has a fleet of 56 aircraft, includ-



ing 26 B737, 2 B737 MAX, 5 A320 neo and 23 A320.

"Over the next 15 months, a total of 50 new B737 MAX aircraft will join the LCC fleet, allowing us to grow our network to new destinations and increase flights on existing routes," Singh said in the message.

According to him, the focus is now on the preparedness for deploying this capacity and that already, more than 800 aircrew and other operational personnel who have joined the entity are under various stages of training.

Together, the combined entity operates around 2,700 flights every week. Out of them, about 700 are operated by Air India Express and the rest by AIX Connect. They fly to 44 destinations, including 14 international

The combined entity will be the Low-Cost Carrier (LCC) of the

Tata Group which took over the reins of Air India and Air India Express in January last year.

"On the integration front, key milestones have been achieved; these include migration to a common reservations and check-in system, a common website and agent portal, aligned product and service offerings, and above all, use of a common brand and domain," Singh said in the message.

Meanwhile, Tata Group is in the process of consolidating its airline business.

Apart from Air India Express-AIX Connect integration, Air India is merging Vistara with itself.

Vistara is a joint venture between Tatas and Singapore Airlines, in which the former holds a 51 per cent stake.

India is one of the fastest growing aviation markets in the world and air traffic is also on the rise.

Nokia produces 7 million units in Chennai plant, exports 50 per cent products

NEW DELHI, Oct 13 (Agencies): Telecom gear maker Nokia said its Chennai plant has achieved a production milestone of 7 million units. The factory, one of Nokia's largest globally, is a large-scale manufacturer of telecom infrastructure equipment including 4G/5G networks for both domestic and global markets.

The Finnish company manu-

factures 5G New Radio (5G NR), 5G massive MIMO products, 4G/LTE radios, as well as fiber broadband equipment, among others, at the plant.

"Our Chennai factory is a testament to the skill and expertise of Indian talent. From being the first to manufacture 5G NR in India to now producing 5G massive MIMO products and transport network elements, we have

come a long way," said Teemu Toiviainen, head of global manufacturing & EMS management.

The company claims it exports 50% of its production. Further, it has increased the localisation of components by up to 2 times compared to previous years in 5G equipment manufacturing.

The company said it is in line with Make in India initiative that encourages companies to

develop and manufacture products in the country.

The factory has completed 15 years of operation this year and is playing a key role in boosting equipment manufacturing in India. "This factory operates with wind and solar energy, contributing up to 81% of green energy consumption until most recently; targeting to be 100% by 2025," added Toiviainen.

Researchers develop most accurate test yet to measure biological ageing

LONDON, Oct 13 (Agencies): A team of European researchers has developed a new test that can accurately measure biological ageing in a clinical setting.

The new test is an epigenetic clock -- a type of biochemical assessment that looks at DNA to understand how well the body is ageing in contrast to its chronological age -- and is the first of these cutting-edge tests to be proven to perform accurately in a clinical setting, in both healthy and unhealthy tissue.

Epigenetic clocks have been proposed as a 'gold standard' for measuring age accurately, beyond a person's biological age, as they are able to measure methylation tags on DNA.

The clock -- named the Glasgow-Karolinska Clock -- developed by teams from University of Glasgow in the UK and the Karolinska Institutet in Sweden, while studying patients for the ageing effects of chronic kidney disease and related treatments.

"This study is the first time in a clinical setting that we can accurately report on the extent of biological as opposed to chrono-



logical ageing in chronic kidney disease patients," said lead author Professor Paul Shiels, from the University of Glasgow.

"Our findings, using the new Glasgow-Karolinska Clock -- show that not only are these patients ageing faster than people in the general population, their accelerated ageing only slows down once they have had a transplant. Treatment with dialysis does not appear to impact this process," he added.

In the study, published in the Journal of Internal Medicine, the team studied more than 400 patients with chronic kidney disease in Sweden alongside

around 100 matched population controls, to better understand the impact on ageing of the disease, including during dialysis treatment and after kidney transplant.

The team used the clocks to measure the change in biological age of around 47 patients one year after kidney transplantation, or one year after the start of their dialysis treatment, as well as how the healthy tissue in 48 controls aged by comparison.

The results showed that for patients with chronic kidney disease, their biological clock is ticking faster than the aver-

age person's. This continues to be the case even after dialysis treatment. Indeed, patients' biological clocks were only shown to slow down following a kidney transplant.

However, while the epigenetic clocks all showed a similar picture, the research team found that none of the current clocks could be shown to be accurate in a clinical setting, and all were found to be inaccurate to differing degrees when tested in healthy tissue over time.

The team's Glasgow-Karolinska Clock that works on healthy and unhealthy tissue addressed this. The results from this new clock matched what doctors saw in patients with chronic kidney disease, and also appeared to accurately assess healthy tissue too. This study is the first realworld test of epigenetic clocks in a normal ageing setting, and against clinical parameters.

As the body ages, a series of factors lead to epigenetic changes and loss of a chemical tag (DNA methylation) from your DNA. This is often associated with a range of diseases common to ageing, such as chronic kidney disease, cancer and heart disease.

Stroke can lead to 10 million deaths by 2050: Biggest lifestyle mistakes to avoid



NEW DELHI, Oct 13 (Agencies): Stroke is among the world's leading causes for death, as per the World Health Organisation (WHO). Although it is a highly preventable and treatable condition, a recent study revealed that strokes could lead to nearly 10 million deaths annually by 2050.

A stroke occurs when the blood supply to a part of the brain is interrupted. This leads to a variety of debilitating consequences. The disruption can lead to a lack of oxygen and essential nutrients reaching the brain cells, causing them to die.

Stroke can cause serious health challenges to the body. Experts share that to lower the risk of strokes, lifestyle factors should be considered.

"In recent years we have observed that various lifestyle factors like lack of exercise, alcohol, diet, obesity, smoking, drug use and stress have been associated with increasing the risk of stroke," said Dr Dhruv Zutshi, Senior Consultant, Neurology, Fortis Hospital.

Other risk factors like hypertension, diabetes, hyperlipidemia and cardiac diseases are also associated with increasing the risk of stroke.

Dr Zutshi added that the risk of stroke is increased or even doubled in case of smoking as compared to nonsmokers or compared with those who quit smoking for more than 10 years.

"Numerous studies show that for every 5-unit increase in BMI (Body mass index) above 25 kg/m2, overall mortality increases by 29%, vascular mortality by 41%, and diabetesrelated mortality by 2 times. In past decade, there's evidence linking air pollution to heart disease including stroke," said Dr Zutshi, sharing more lifestyle factors that can increase the risk of stroke.

Dr Tushar Raut, Consultant, Neurology at Kokilaben Dhirubhai Ambani Hospital, Mumbai, shared lifestyle habits that increase stroke risk.

Sedentary Lifestyle: Today, working in an office for a majority includes working at a desk for long hours. Physical inactivity has become the norm. Sitting for prolonged periods without regular exercise can lead to obesity, high blood pressure, and diabetes, all of which increase the risk of stroke.

Unhealthy Diet: The shift of our diet to include more fast food, processed meals, and high-sugar beverages has had a negative effect on our health. Processed food is high in salt. Saturated fats and trans fats in these foods contribute to high cholesterol and hypertension, both major risk factors for stroke.

Tobacco and Alcohol

Consumption: Smoking and excessive alcohol intake are associated with a higher risk of stroke. Tobacco narrows and damages blood vessels, while excessive alcohol can lead to high blood pressure and irregular heart rhythms. Increased Stress: Modern life is often char-

Modern life is often characterized by high levels of stress, whether from work, financial pressures, or personal challenges. Chronic stress encourages unhealthy habits like smoking and overeating. It can also lead to hypertension.

Lack of Sleep: The hustle culture today and the constant need to be 'connected' have led to widespread sleep deprivation. Lack of sleep can result in obesity, diabetes, and heart disease, all of which are risk factors for stroke.

Environmental Factors: Urbanisation and industrialization have led to increased exposure to air pollution. Fine particulate matter from car exhaust, factories, and other sources can lead to inflammation in the body, increasing the risk of stroke.

"We must not ignore any warning signs and go in for regular health check-ups. Early diagnosis of conditions like diabetes and high blood pressure can lead to managing and controlling these conditions and reducing the risk of stroke," said Dr Tushar Raut.

How working night shifts messes up appetite and food habits, study reveals

NEW DELHI, Oct 13 (Agencies): Scientists reveal how working night shifts interferes with appetite, hunger and food habits, sometimes resulting in weight gain.

The disruption in the body's biological clock, or circadian misalignment, brought about by working night shifts affects the hormones which regulating appetite, the team of scientists, led by the University of Bristol, UK, said.

Circadian misalignment is also commonly associated with the phenomenon of 'jet-lag'.

The team focussed on the adrenal gland, situated near the kidney, which produces hormones that control many physiological functions including metabolism and appetite, called glucocorticoid hormones.

A misalignment

between light and dark cues led to a disturbance in the functioning of these hormones that then affected the appetite of the jet-lagged group of animals, driving an increased desire to eat significantly more during the inactive phase of the day, the scientists said in their study published in the journal Communications Biology.

They said that their findings reveal how circadian misalignment can profoundly alter food habits much to the detriment of metabolic health and that they could help the millions of people that work through the night and struggle with

weight gain.

The glucocorticoid hormones in the adre-

nal glands directly regulate a group of brain peptides controlling appetitive behaviour, with some increasing appetite (orexigenic) and some decreasing appetite (anorexigenic).

appetite (anorexigenic). In this study, the jet-lagged group's orexigenic hypothalamic neuropeptides (NPY) became dysregulated, which the authors say may be promising targets for drug treatments adapted to treat eating disorders and obesity.

Further, the team discovered that while the control rats ate about 90 per cent of their daily intake during their active phase and only 11 per cent during their inactive phase, the jet-lagged rats consumed about 54 per cent of their daily calories during their



inactive phase, with no increased physical activity in this time.

This was roughly fivetimes more than what the control rats consumed during the inactive phase, suggesting that it was the timing of calorie consumption that was affected, the scientists said.

"For those who are working night shifts long-term, we recommend they try to maintain daylight exposure, cardiovascular exercise and mealtimes at regulated hours.

"However, internal

brain messages to drive increased appetite are difficult to override with 'discipline' or 'routine' so we are currently designing studies to assess rescue strategies and pharmacological intervention drugs," said senior author Becky Conway-Campbell, Research Fellow at Bristol.



India-Pakistan fever, hospitals turn into hotels

NEW DELHI, Oct 13 (Agencies): Cricket fever has gripped Ahmedabad ahead of Saturday's World Cup group stage clash between arch-rivals India and Pakistan and a visit to the hospitals near the venue of the match in the western Indian city clearly shows the degree of excitement. Quite a few of the hospitals have seen a sudden influx of patients booked in for check-ups involving a night's stay to coincide with the most anticipated match of the World Cup.

Several doctors told local media the rush for check-up 'packages' was an ingenious way to find affordable accommodation as hotel costs have soared up to 20 fold ahead of the match.

"We have come across some cases of people coming to watch the India-Pakistan match also taking an appointment for health checkups and staying in hospitals," said Tushar Patel, president of the Ahmedabad Medical Association.

The Ahmedabad Hospitals and Nursing Homes Association has discouraged its members from accommodating such fans. "We have asked our members not to entertain such requests. Hospitals are not meant for nonpatients," its president Bharat Gadhavi said. The first batch of tickets for Saturday's game were sold out within an hour of going on sale in August, prompting

BCCI to release anoth-

er 14,000 earlier this month.

Ahmedabad resident Hemish Patel and his friends, after several days of failed attempts, grabbed four tickets, each costing Rs 6,000.

"We logged into the site with multiple devices," he said. "We constantly kept on refreshing the site and were able to book within 10 minutes after the sale of tickets began."

Patel was one of the lucky few. Tickets are fetching up to 25 times face value on resale and city police arrested four youths on Tuesday for selling fakes.

Airfare has surged up to four times and Indian Railways will run a pair of super fast trains linking Mumbai and Ahmedabad.

Mother First Priority Before Pakistan: Jasprit Bumrah On Returning To Ahmedabad For Cricket World Cup Clash

AHMEDABAD, Oct 13 (Agencies): India fast bowler Jasprit Bumrah says seeing his mother again takes priority over Saturday's blockbuster World Cup clash against arch-rivals Pakistan. Bumrah will be playing in his home city of Ahmedabad in front of 132,000 fans in the world's biggest cricket stadium. However, family matters come first for the 29-yearold. "I've been away for a while now. I'll be happy to see my mother at home," said Bumrah after taking an impressive 4-39 in Wednesday's eight-wicket win against Afghanistan.

Bumrah was raised by his mother Daljit, a school principal, after his father died suddenly just before he turned five.

"I'm going to see her. That's the first basic thing for me." Only then will Bumrah focus on facing Pakistan on a ground where he has yet to play a one-day international although he is more than familiar with the imposing arena as it is the home of his

Gujarat IPL team.

"I have not played a one-dayer there but I have played a Test



match. The atmosphere is going to be exciting. I'm sure a lot of people are going to come. So, it will be a sight to see. So yeah, hoping for the best over there."

Self-confessed Manchester United fan Bumrah celebrated the dismissal of Afghanistan opener Ibrahim Zadran by pressing his right index finger to his temple. However, he insisted it was not a tribute to United striker Marcus Rashford.

"Nothing like that. I just felt like it, so I did it," he said.

As India celebrated a second win in two matches after seeing off Australia in their opener, Afghanistan were left licking their wounds. Wednesday's loss followed a defeat to Bangladesh at the weekend and they now sit at the foot of the 10-nation standings.

Star leg-spinner Rashid Khan, who claimed the only two Indian wickets to fall, was only brought into the attack in the 15th over when India had already stormed to 125-0.

Coach Jonathan Trott, the former England batsman, said that skipper Hashmatullah Shahidi "obviously had a gut feel that he wanted to go with".

"That's a captain's prerogative but certainly you want a guy like Rash in the attack as soon as possible. So, it's always something we'll look at."

ICC World Cup: Dominant South Africa thrash lacklustre Australia by 134 runs

South Africa rode on a fine century by opener Quinton de Kock

LUCKNOW, Oct 13 (Agencies): South Africa reaffirmed their status as serious contenders as their pacers fired in tandem after Quinton de Kock's blazing century, paving the way for a dominant 134-run win over Australia in the World Cup here on Thursday.

If de Kock showed his class with a masterful 109 off 106 balls to take the Proteas to 311/7, the fast bowlers were at their ruthless best, bundling Australia for 177 in 40.5 overs for their second consecutive win.

The South Africans entered this game after a comprehensive victory in their opener against Sri Lanka.

Australia, on the other hand, bowled without a plan, looked equally clueless with the bat -- losing wickets in clumps -- and were sloppy on the field, dropping as many as five catches.

The loss will severely dent their confidence. They were also outplayed by India in their opener and sit second last in the 10-team table.

De Kock, who will retire from the format after the World Cup, oozed confidence while scoring his second consecutive century with the help of eight boundaries and five maximums while Aiden Markram smashed 56 off 44 to help the team post the highest ODI total in Lucknow.

The South African quicks were relentless with the new ball and bowled with accuracy to essentially finish off the match before the 18th over of the Australian innings, with Pat Cummins' side



tottering at 70/6.

Lungi Ngidi (1/18) set the tone with some incisive bowling. Marco Jansen (2/54) backed Nigidi and reaped the benefit as he removed Mitchell Marsh (7) without much trouble.

David Warner looked to get going but Ngidi struck for a wicket-maiden seventh over.

Kagiso Rabada (3/33) joined the party with the vital strikes of Steve Smith (19) and Josh Inglis (5) off consecutive overs.

As the ball hit Smith's pad Rabada looked unsure, but de Kock insisted on appealing. To South Africa's delight and Smith's disbelief, the umpire was forced to change his decision as the ball tracking technology showed it was hitting the leg stump.

Australia's trouble with leftarm spin continued as Keshav Maharaj (2/30) caught Glenn Maxwell (3) off his own bowling.

Marnus Labuschagne (46) and Mitchell Starc (27) stitched a fighting 69-run stand for the seventh wicket but that was not enough to change the course of the match.

Earlier, De Kock paced his innings well and troubled the Australian bowling attack, which cut a sorry figure, on a difficult Ekana pitch.

The rub of the green also went the Proteas' way as the Australians were guilty of spilling numerous catches.

Off-spinner Glenn Maxwell (2/34) was their most successful bowler while the others managed to get some wickets at the fag end of the innings.

After a rather sedate start, De Kock, who calls this stadium 'home' during the IPL, put a move on things.

He used Mitchell Starc's pace to flick one over deep backward square leg to get the first six of the match in the fifth over.

Both Temba Bavuma (35) and de Kock skilfully nullified the early threat that the Australian pacers generally pose.

In fact, skipper Cummins was at his wit's end and kept shuffling between all his bowlers to find a breakthrough.

After playing the role of the sheet anchor with 35 off 55 balls, Bavuma decided to pull the trigger.

He had survived twice before
-- a top edge which Adam
Zampa failed to judge and then
when sub Sean Abbott caught
the ball on the rope and lost
balance. Abbott threw the ball
towards a waiting Strac, but his
throw was inaccurate.

The South African skipper attempted a sweep but the ball found David Warner.

The back-to-back maximums off Josh Hazlewood over fine leg, and the majestic six over midwicket for his hundred, were the highlights of de Kock's innings

The wicketkeeper-batter eventually fell to a freak dismissal as the ball deflected from the back of his willow into his chest and onto the stumps.

Markram, who was dropped on 1 by Cummins off his own bowling, clobbered seven fours and a six.

NEW DELHI, Oct 13 (Agencies): Former Chief selector MSK Prasad feels that Shubman Gill definitely play in the India vs Pakistan clash in the World Cup on October 14.

Gill's performance in 2023 has been exceptional. He has played some remarkable innings in ODI cricket, scoring a total of 1,230 runs in just 20 ODIs, making him the leading run-scorer in this format this year. His average is 72.35, with a strike rate of 105.03. He has scored as many as six centuries in the year 2023. With his sixth century of the year, Gill joined Virat Kohli, Sachin Tendulkar, and other Indian legends in the elite list of batsmen with five or more hundreds in a year.

Gill has been battling health issues that have

ticipation in the World Cup 2023 match against Pakistan. He was diagnosed with dengue and had to be admitted to Chennai's Kaveri hospital due to a drop in his platelet count. Despite being discharged from the hospital, his recovery is still ongoing, and it remains uncertain whether he will be fit to play in the crucial match. However, his speedy recovery has put him right in contention for a return to India's playing

Gill had traveled to Ahmedabad to link up with the team after the Afghanistan game and had practised in the nets for an hour on Thursday.

Talking to Hindustan Times, Prasad said that Gill would definitely play the match against Pakistan, pointing out that practising in the nets has

shown that the 24-yearold has recovered well ahead of schedule.

"I think we can put an end to all kinds of speculations. Shubman Gill will definitely play this game (vs Pakistan). He's too good a player to miss out. He had just a fever. He has recovered. It was not threatening at all that we would even think about replacements. It's all rumours that are coming out (about the seriousness of the illness) in whatever form that you are hearing."

"What we heard was that as a matter of precaution, he couldn't play the second game otherwise he was fine. He stayed back for one more day in Chennai as a precaution. He recovered well, and was discharged. See if someone is playing for 1 hour, that means he has recovered. This is an all-important game against Pakistan. If he is fit, which I'm sure he is, then he should be in India's playing XI,"

Prasad also pointed

out Gill's stats in Ahmedabad, which is his home ground in the IPL. The former selector said that the 24-year-old knows the ground well and should be a sure-shot starter for the match against Pakistan.

Prasad further commented that India should be going in with their best playing XI for the game, which means that a match-winner like Gill should be an automatic selection.

"This is the ground where he has played his franchise cricket. He understands every blade of grass about this ground. He knows how

to get runs here. With the kind of record he has at this ground and the kind of record he had in the last one year, he should definitely play. In the first couple of games, especially against Afghanistan, we didn't require him. The others did the job but now if we look at Pakistan, they are also coming on the back of two wins.

It would be very good if we go in with the best possible XI. Ishan of course has done reasonably well in the second game, but when a person like Shubman Gill is there, you have one more match-winner to the XI. This is not a T20 game where he needs to go slam-bang. He can take his time, get set, occupy the crease and then see how it goes. Ideally, I would

want him in the XI,"

"You go from venue to venue, and they do vary a lot, and we have seen here that there's been that spin, and the pitch has varied perhaps as the games moved on as well, so throughout the day. But definitely, both teams have some good spin bowlers that no doubt will play a big part tomorrow," Williamson said on the eve of the match.

"Not just here in India."

"Not just here in India, but any country when you play, certainly world events where there are multiple games on surfaces, in quite quick succession that you do see such a variety of surfaces that you have to try and adapt to as quickly as possible. So, from where the tournament starts to perhaps midway and towards the end, it can all look quite different," he said.
